



Reading II: Romans 8: 31b-34


This section is a hymn to the love of God for us is made plain to see in the Father's willingness to hand over His Son to death for our redemption, now that same Son intercedes for us with the Father.

Last weekend the 2 candles on St. Joseph's Altar were lit in memory of Peter Kern by a friend.

During the Transfiguration, Peter was ready to build three tents: one for Jesus, one for Moses and one for Elijah. He was giving equal import to each of them. However, through the cloud and the voice of God the Father, it is revealed that Jesus is the beloved Son, we are to listen to Him. Frequently, we compartmentalize our lives; we designate our time for work, time for play, time for sleep and our time for God. We compartmentalize our relationships; we focus on our parents, the children, our co-workers, ourselves, and God. We even cause divisions in our finances; this is money for rent, food, clothing, entertainment, savings and God. All too often, we put God on equal par with everything else, or worse, we give to the Lord only the scraps leftover. In the Transfiguration, the Father reveals the fullness of what, or actually who we have received: Jesus glorified and willing to suffer and die for us. May we repent of the times when we failed to recognize God in our midst, when we failed to keep Him at the focus of our lives, when we put other people and things before Him. I encourage you to come to the Lord in confession; recognize the fullness of mercy He is willing to give so that you too may experience His glory.

A refresher on Confession Procedures: Forgive me Father for I have sinned; it has been approximately (state the amount of time approximately since your last confession) since my last confession. These are my sins (state your sins and approximately how frequently you fell into each sin). The priest will give you a penance (a prayer or action to do to help prevent you from falling again). Then say an act of contrition (statement saying you are sorry for your sins, you'll do your best to try not to sin again, and you need God's help). The priest will then say the words of absolution to forgive you of your sins. Then go in peace and complete your penance, rejoicing in the Lord and His mercy. If you forget any part or prayers, just ask the priest and he is there to help you receive the Lord's mercy.



Foot Washing The liturgical rite of the washing of the feet on Holy Thursday takes its inspiration from the Last Supper, where Jesus first washed the feet of his apostles and commanded them to do likewise (see Jn 13:4-14). During Holy Thursday Mass on March 28, **Father Mullins will wash the feet of 7 parishioners. If you would like to volunteer to share in this meaningful ritual, please call the Parish Office. Learn and Live the Faith (Compendium of CCC)

#310 "What are the effects of this sacrament (of Confession)?"

The effects of the sacrament of Penance are: reconciliation with God and therefore the forgiveness of sins; reconciliation with the Church; recovery, if it has been lost, of the state of grace; remission of the eternal punishment merited by mortal sins, and remission, at least in part, of the temporal punishment which is the consequence of sin; peace, serenity of conscience and spiritual consolation; and an increase of spiritual strength for the struggle of Christian living."

#311 "Can this sacrament be celebrated in some cases with a general confession and general absolution?"

In cases of serious necessity (as in imminent danger of death) recourse may be had to a communal celebration of Reconciliation with general confession and general absolution, as long as the norms of the Church are observed and there is the intention of individually confessing one's grave sins in due time."

#312 "What are indulgences?"

Indulgences are the remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven. The faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains the indulgence under prescribed conditions for either himself or the departed. Indulgences are granted through the ministry of the Church which, as the dispenser of the grace of redemption, distributes the treasury of the merits of Christ and the Saints."

Saint of the Week

Alexander of Alexandria (250-328AD) was born in Alexandria, Egypt. He became the bishop of Alexandria in 313, and fought the spreading heresy of Arianism fiercely. In 321, Alexander excommunicated Arius (starter of Arianism). Alexander is also credited with drawing up the acts of the First General Council of Nicea in 325. He was the mentor of Saint Athanasius. Feast Day: 26 February.

Saint Quote of the Week: *"For the Lord Incarnate was condemned, in order to bestow mercy on us; bound, in order to loose us; seized, in order to free us; He suffered, to heal our sufferings; He died, to restore life to us; He was buried, to raise us up again."* - St. Alexander of Alexandria.

Word of the Week: **Annulment Process** - an investigation by the court of the Catholic Church (Tribunal) to discern whether God sealed the bond of marriage or not. If everything necessary was present at the time of the exchange of vows, then God sealed the marriage bond and only death can do them part. However, if in the investigation there is proof that one or several critical components were missing, then God would not have united the couple and they would be permitted to marry someone else. There are two forms of annulment cases: formal and informal. Informal annulments are used for a Catholic who married only in a civil ceremony outside the Church without the Bishop's permission. Formal Annulment cases are used for any other situation. Any divorced person seeking to remarry should first speak with a priest to begin paperwork for an annulment.

Join us for the Stations of the Cross Wednesday evenings during Lent at 6:30 PM. Liturgy Notes: During Lent, the visual environment is simplified; no floral decorations, the **Gloria** and **Alleluia** are omitted and the **vestments are purple** to signify a time of penance. The purpose of the "**liturgical pruning**" is to remind us this is a time to seek out reconciliation with God.
