

SUNDAY'S READINGS

Reading I: Genesis 18: 1-10a

Abraham hosts 3 visitors (an image of the Trinity). The Lord promises Abraham and Sarah that they will have a son.

Reading II: Colossians 1: 24-28

"What is lacking" means adding our suffering to that of Christ, so that the fruits of His redemption are applied to men's souls. Paul says his mission is to proclaim Christ.

The Gospel: Luke 10: 38-42

Martha and Mary host Jesus. However, Martha is preoccupied with the details of hospitality, while Mary gives her full attention to the guest, namely Jesus. The contrast is made between the active life and the contemplative one.

Hospitality is the friendly and generous reception and entertainment of guests, visitors or strangers. Essentially, it's the act of making others feel welcome, comfortable, and valued, often involving warmth, kindness and generosity. In the first reading, we hear of the generous hospitality of Abraham. He saw three strangers walking through the desert past his tent. To walk in the desert can be life-threatening. If Abraham ignored them, he could be morally responsible for their deaths. Instead, Abraham implored these strangers to rest in his tent, to have some water and to eat some fresh food. These three strangers turned out to be God who in turn blessed Abraham and his barren wife with a child. May we offer hospitality to all of God's children, because what we do for the least of them, we do for Christ.

This weekend we have special guests from the Corona Self-Help Center in New York; they will give a brief talk and sell T-shirts after Mass to support their mission. The Corona Self-Help Center offers a free recovery residence for those suffering from substance abuse. Participants are provided with meals, health care, hygiene, educational and sports therapy and receive substance abuse counseling daily in a 12 step program. Participants can also receive job training in the form of on-site workshops. The Corona Self-Help Center also coordinates with family members to help integrate them as a recovery support social network. Focusing on the spiritual, mental and spiritual condition as a whole, participants obtain assistance in dealing with their addiction to be able to lead a productive life and benefit their community.

#531 "What is required and what is forbidden by the tenth commandment?

#532 "What does Jesus call for in poverty of spirit?

Jesus calls his disciples to prefer him to everything and everyone. Detachment from riches – in the spirit of evangelical poverty – and self-abandonment to divine providence free us from anxiety about the future and prepare us for the blessedness of the "poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven" (*Mathew 5:3*)."

#533 "What is the greatest human desire?

The greatest desire of the human person is to see God. "I want to see God" is the cry of our whole being. We realize our true and full happiness in the vision and beatitude of the One who created us out of love and draws us to himself with infinite love.

"Whoever sees God has obtained all the goods of which he can conceive." (Saint Gregory of Nyssa)"

Word of the Week: Byzantine Rite – is a liturgical tradition celebrated within some Eastern Catholic Churches. It is the second most widely used rite after the Roman/Latin rite. The Byzantine Rite originated in the Greek city of Antioch in the First Century but was perfected in Byzantium (Constantinople). Its liturgy is characterized by its rich symbolism, elaborate ceremonies, and use of icons. The rite is known for its use of leavened bread in the Eucharist, distribution of communion by spoon, and the presence of an iconostasis separating the sanctuary from the congregation. Furthermore, its liturgies are marked with the substantial use of incense and the chanting of hymns, so as to symbolize the liturgy of the Church in heaven.



Saint of the Week: Bridget of Sweden (1303-1373) grew up as the oldest of three children in a holy family. From the time she was a child, she devoted herself deeply to the passion of Jesus. When she was only ten years old, it is recorded that she had a vision of Jesus on the cross

and heard him say, "Look at me, my child." "Who has treated you like this?" little Bridget exclaimed. "Those who despise me and reject my love for them." From that moment on, Bridget tried to prevent people from offending Jesus. She married at a young age, but she and her husband set their hearts on serving God. They had eight children, one of whom was Saint Catherine of Sweden. Bridget worked as the queen's personal servant. Bridget tried to help King Magnus and Queen Blanche lead a better life, however, for the most part, they did not listen to her. All her life, Bridget had wonderful visions and received special messages from God. After her husband died, Bridget cast away her rich clothes and lived as a poor nun. Later, in 1346, she began the Order of the Most Holy Savior, also known as the Bridgettines. She still maintained her own busy life, caring for the poor and sick, traveling to do good wherever she went. And through all this activity, Jesus continued to reveal many secrets to her, which she received without the slightest pride. Shortly before her death, the saint went on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. At the shrines there, she had visions of what Jesus had said and done in each place. All of Saint Bridget's revelations about Jesus' sufferings were published after her death. Feast Day: 23 July.

Gospel Reflection by Seminarian Owen:

The Gospel today points out Martha's worrying about the task at hand. How often do we find ourselves preoccupied and pulled in many directions? It's not that what Martha was doing was wrong but her good intentions became clouded by distraction and worry. She lost sight of being present with Christ.

In our own lives it's often the "little things" like our tasks or routines that amplify our need for control and our fear of not doing enough. This quietly draws our focus away from the Lord. We can be physically present in prayer or at Mass, yet mentally consumed by our schedules and subsequently our worries.

Jesus doesn't rebuke Martha for her work, but invites her to refocus on the "better part" of it. We should not abandon our responsibilities, but anchor them in His presence. We are reminded in this Gospel that peace comes not from getting everything done, but from being with Jesus and letting Him be at the center of our hearts.

This week let's think about the little things that may be distracting us from having a continued awareness of Christ's presence in our daily life.
